Organized Chaos

Working in a semi abstract or abstract style involves different stages in the painting process. Some of these stages are often intuitive, disorganized, fast and impulsive, leaving some part to chance.

Some other stages involve trying to organize that apparent chaos making the colors work together, the composition pleasing to the eye and the painting balanced, consistent with what the artist wants to communicate.

In a way, working in an abstract or semi abstract style is about reconciling opposites and making them work together. That is why this exhibition is called organized chaos - All the artists in this show went through the process of letting their imagination go free and then reflecting on how to make a painting that works, channeling that freedom into an organized chaos.



I juxtapose images of migrating crows against eroded, rusted, decayed and tagged walls - indicative of how both time and people leave their mark on a surface.... it is also a reflection on the crows' daily diaspora from rural areas into various neighbourhoods in and around Vancouver.... for me, this fusion of natural and cultural landscape embodies that "push" or a fascination for the city - shared by humans and birds alike - and that "pull" that always draws you back home, to the family tree...

Picasso once said, "It took me four years to paint like Raphael, but a lifetime to paint like a child." I could draw like Leonardo da Vinci at fifteen but spent a lifetime puzzling out why we do it? Incorporating my own experience and research in many fields of knowledge I ask, " How do we process the world around us to form our personal ideas about reality?

In my early twenty's I was painting an African violet plant when suddenly I could see them moving in response to sunlight. The real violet was in constant flow and flux and my efforts to fix the appearance of the violet to paper had removed the life from it. It was clear to me from that moment on that reality is experienced as a flow of sensual information. The flow is filtered, sorted and evaluated by the brain, then aided by memory and experience it is assembled into the concept of reality we use.

My work uses a similar constructive model as I attempt to convey the 'sense' of a subject as well as its outward appearance. I use aesthetic, academic and logical analysis and a strong intuition. "My best state of working is when intuition and reason are not separate ways of thinking but rather different ways of knowing. One is informed from the senses, the other by outside sources."

Our world is a fantastic, awe inspiring place and we are invited to take part in it through the portals of our senses. Art can reflect the energy of this world as well as its appearance. Art excites our senses and inspires curiosity. With many layers of meaning in my work, I strive for a balance between beauty and possibility, between movement and object, between order and chaos. My greatest hope is that you find refreshment and nourishment in my paintings.



Between the dance of the universe and the mind of the human is the misapprehension of disorder. The world is ever renewing and dying, simultaneously expanding and contracting beyond the grasping limits of lineal logic. The Order we seek is bound to the Order imposed by Time and is only attainable by the use of patterns, paradigms, fractals. Bits and pieces that reflect an immense wholeness we cannot see from the smallness where we stand, yet feel with all our heart and soul.

Mila Kostic is Canadian visual artist and curator. She has worked as a curator, educator, and as facilitator of visual and community based arts, working with diverse artists and organizations representing multiple disciplines. She has been actively exhibiting and making art for over twenty years.

Mila has spearheaded many of her own artistic projects and has been associated in particular with promoting modern art in British Columbia and Canada. Mila is known predominantly for her large-scale abstract acrylic and oil paintings on canvas. Her work revolves around the experimentation with lines and colour; and thematically on the processes of creating a painting.

Rather than re-creating a landscape on a canvas, I aim to express its essence. Obviously, no single work can hope to distill the complex spirit of a landscape, much less the infinitely sophisticated ecology that sustains it. So, in order to capture this richness, I work on a large number of paintings concurrently. This allows me to transport strong elements and effective techniques from one piece to the next. Each multi-layered rendering shares some details with the other works in the series. The overlap of elements enriches each individual expression and deepens the cohesion within the series. Ultimately, each piece captures some fragment of the landscape's power until the larger body of work coalesces to express its deepest essence. Art has the power to make one see things in a new light. It allows us to develop a love for places and things that we would otherwise not have noticed, or thought of as ugly or boring.



Sandrine Pelissier, AFCA Sandrinepelissier.com



Originally from France, Sandrine Pelissier has been living in North Vancouver, Canada for the past 16 years.

She is very inspired by her Pacific west coast surroundings and paints the BC landscape, figures and still life, mixing elements of drawing and patterning into her paintings. Her work has been collected and exhibited extensively in Canada and internationally. She is also part of the Art Rentals and sales program of the Vancouver Art Gallery. Many of her paintings have been published in Art books and magazines (Artist Magazine, Watercolor Artist Magazine, Acrylic Magazine, International Artist Magazine). North Light/F+W Books published her watercolor instruction book: Fearless Watercolor

At the core of my work is an exploration of the balance between opposite concepts, like the symmetry of geometric patterns and the asymmetry of organic designs, transparency and solidity, reality and imagination.

The play between symmetry and asymmetry is perceptible in the superimposition of ornamental patterns on top of biological structures like tree trunks. It also shows in the representation of natural patterns like the rings of a tree with geometric repetitive shapes. In my still life paintings, the delicate organic shapes of the flora are strongly contrasting with very bold decorative patterns.
